From the President:

As I begin my seventh year as the Civic Association President. I want to sincerely thank the board and committee members for the great support and encouragement they have given me. My special thanks to the other Board members who have again stepped forward for another year to help our work continue.

For the coming 2017-18 year we hope to present some new ideas and sponsor more opportunities for residents of Kings Park to get together socially and also become more involved in expanding community spirit.

There is a notable decline in KPCA membership. The \$25 membership fee (\$20 for seniors) shouldn't be the reason. There are many new residents in Kings Park and we hope they will be joining the Kings Park Civic Association (KPCA) to show their support for the many community programs and services that make this a great neighborhood.

Often many of our longtime residents *forget* to rejoin each year and have to be reminded. Talk to your neighbors about joining (*or rejoining*) the KPCA.

The Braddock Road Widening Study is coming to an end. The recommendation of the community representatives on the Task Force to not widen Braddock Road will be presented to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors this Fall. The details of the recommended intersection improvements, pedestrian and bicycle paths, and a protected crosswalk to the Kings Park Shopping Center are detailed on the KPCA website. The second part of the Study considered the building of a Transit Center at the Kings Park Shopping Center. The Task Force recommendation was a strong NO. The details of the Task Force's recommendation that was presented to the Community Information Meetings held at LBSS on June 26th is also posted on the KPCA website. If the recommendations are accepted by the Board of Supervisors the next phase is the design and engineering of the *proposed* improvements. During that phase, the affected community representations have an opportunity to view and comment on specific details. Optimistically, actual construction and the implementation of lane changes may not be completed until 2024.

The KPCA is planning on presenting a "Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness" event in September. The event will take place over several days and at different locations in Kings Park. The objective is to showcase what you can do to help prepare yourself and your family in case of a local emergency, and

extend that to the concept of “neighbors helping neighbors”. The event will highlight the capabilities of the County’s first responders (Fire, EMS, and Police) and also provide a show-and-tell demonstration of what *emergency response* capabilities we already have among our community members.

Those of you who have already indicated an interest in emergency preparedness and a willingness to help others on your KPCA Membership form will be invited to be active participants in the September event. More details are forthcoming.

Traffic, pedestrian, and bicycle safety must be concern of our residents. The county wide “Slow Down, You Live Here, We Live Here” campaign is still ongoing. All the streets in Kings Park have a 25 mile per hour speed limit, including Southampton! Don’t become complacent on our neighborhood streets. STOP, Yield, Speed Bump, and Speed Limit signs are not *suggestions* for your consideration – it’s the LAW. Observations have shown that some of the more egregious violators are residents of Kings Park! The seconds you think you are saving can have serious consequences.

The KPCA Board’s efforts are aimed at giving more back to the community – we want your dues to show lasting impact. Many residents don’t realize that the KPCA is responsible for the upkeep of the common areas of Kings Park – entrances at Kings Park Drive and Southampton, median strip on Kings Park Drive, the two traffic circles, and the traffic calming nubs (bump outs) along Southampton. These are costs that are borne by membership dues. With a decline in membership we have to do more belt tightening. The upkeep of the plantings at the entrances and the nubs was previously is done by the volunteers of the Beautification committee. They need more help! Our few longtime volunteers are finding it more difficult to do it alone – we need more individuals and families to step forward and help. We want everyone to take pride in the beauty of our community.

KPCA community meetings are now scheduled for September, October, December, January, March, and May. We realize that you have a busy schedule but we encourage you to attend whenever you can. Your time should be rewarded so if there is some topic of community interest or a guest speaker you would like to hear let us know. We are looking for opportunities to keep our residents informed and provide opportunities to know their neighbors and what is available to make your lives more enjoyable.

This is your community and we want you to be an active participant in any way you can.

Neighborhood Watch is a volunteer citizen program of mutual assistance among neighbors aimed at reducing crime in Kings Park at the grass roots level. It involves neighbors getting to know neighbors, staying alert to the potential for crime, and willing to look out for each other's interest.

The Information Police need when you contact them:

- What happened
- When
- Where (address or street names, e.g. Victoria between Grantham and Kings Park)
- Is anyone hurt
- License numbers and vehicle descriptions
- Direction of travel
- Description(s) of suspect(s)
- If there were weapons involved

Please gather this information without endangering yourself or others

Police contacts:

Emergency number 911 for crimes in progress, life-threatening events, or crime immediately resulting in property damage;

Non-emergency number (703) 691-2131 for crimes already committed, suspect no longer in the area, or observed suspicious activity.







Interesting Things About the 4th of July

1. Initially adopted by Congress on July 2, 1776, the revised version of the Declaration of Independence was not adopted until two days later.
2. The oldest, continuous Independence Day celebration in the United States is the 4th of July Parade in Bristol, Rhode Island; it began in 1785.
3. The Declaration of Independence was penned by Thomas Jefferson and signed by 56 men representing 13 colonies.
4. One of the United States' patriotic songs, "Yankee Doodle" was originally sung by British military officers prior to the Revolution as a means to mock the disorganized American colonists who fought alongside them during the French and Indian Wars.
5. The "Star Spangled Banner" was written by Francis Scott Key during the War of 1812 and not decreed the official national anthem of the United States until 1931.
6. Three U.S. Presidents, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe, died on July 4th; Adams and Jefferson died within hours of each other in 1826 while Monroe died in 1831.
7. The Pennsylvania Evening Post was the first newspaper to print the Declaration of Independence.
8. The country's 30th president, Calvin Coolidge, was born on Independence Day in 1872.
9. Americans consume about 155 million hot dogs on Independence Day alone; it is the biggest hot dog holiday of the year.
10. Americans began observing the Fourth of July as early as 1777, when the first-ever major celebration in Philadelphia included a parade and a thirteen-shot cannon salute and fireworks.
11. To avoid cracking it, the Liberty Bell has not been rung since 1846. To mark the quintessential day, every fourth of July it is symbolically tapped 13 times.

12. The American Pyrotechnics Association (APA) estimates that more than 14,000 professional firework displays light up the skies in the United States each 4th of July.

13. The average age of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence was 45. Benjamin Franklin was the oldest at age 70, and Edward Rutledge was the youngest at age 26.

The Search for Groundcover

After removing English ivy (*Hedera helix*) from our wooded backyard, I wanted to find a low-growing groundcover for the area that did not need to be mowed.

Before I knew anything about invasive plants, I tried periwinkle (*Vinca minor*), moneywort (*Lysimachia nummularia*), and bugleweed (*Ajuga reptans*). These plants are all considered invasive in Virginia and should not be planted. Luckily, none of these have taken over the yard – yet.

Moss seemed like a good solution since it was already growing in places. It has spread, but it does not block out weeds so the taller weeds have to be pulled or mowed.

Another plant that I have tried is dwarf mondo grass (*Ophiopogon japonicus*) which looks like a clump of grass and grows 2 to 3 inches high. It is not a native plant, but so far has not been declared to be invasive. It makes a nice border and does not spread too fast.

The best groundcover I have found is a native plant called partridgeberry (*Mitchella repens*). It is low-growing, crowds out most of the taller weeds, is green year-round and has white flowers and red berries that add interest and provide for wildlife. This plant just appeared in the yard one year and has been slowly spreading ever since. If you want to try this plant, the Virginia Native Plant Society could tell you which native plant nurseries would carry it.

[Native Plants for Northern Virginia](#), a full-color booklet from Plant NoVA Natives, and [Non-Native Invasive ID and Control](#), a Fairfax County publication, are two resources I have used as I try to change the backyard into a lower-maintenance natural area.
