Kings Park Clean Up Day

This year's annual Kings Park "Clean Up Day" will be held Saturday, May 5th from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. Large trucks from Fairfax County will be stationed in the parking lot by the basketball courts off the Trafalgar Court entrance to KP Park for disposal of large items that trash companies will not pick up. You can take your items directly to the trucks at Trafalgar or call Roy Warner to schedule a pick up by neighborhood volunteers. More volunteers are needed so please contact Roy if you can help (and remember to bring gloves!). The Kings Park Civic Association will rent at least two 14' U-Haul trucks to pick up your large items and deliver them to the county trucks but you must call at least a week in advance to schedule a pick up.

KPCA dues make this service possible. KPCA membership is required if you need help with your large items. Volunteers will have membership forms with them when they pick up items from your home, so you can join the KPCA that day if you have not yet done so.

Our community is indebted to all those who have helped in years past. We are grateful to all our volunteers for their assistance. Call Roy at 703-250-5328 to volunteer or schedule a pick up. Please do not wait until the last minute as we cannot honor last minute requests for help. Thank you.

The most significant action will be a decision on the location(s) for elevated walkways at those locations. The Braddock Road Widening Project (as it was originally titled) has not yet been formally presented with Recommendations to the Board of Supervisors.

Facts & Trivia: Neighborhood Watch

Whenever you sign up for a Kings Park Neighborhood Watch (KPNW) patrol, you sometimes discover some KP facts or trivia from the partner you patrol with. Some KP residents like to do patrols during the day, evening, or at night. You can schedule yourself by contacting the KPNW coordinator (terry.boschert@verizon.net) for a patrol that's convenient or for an opening that is unfilled. Some folks like to drive while others like to be the passenger. Some even prefer to do patrols primarily with their KP friends. There are even some folks who like to stop for or pick up coffee during the patrol or go for lunch afterwards.

Here is some trivia about KP that I've picked up or shared:

- 1. The patrol route is about 18-19 miles long.
- 2. Takes about 60-90 minutes to complete.
- 3. About 30 streets are patrolled.
- 4. There are 13 cul-de-sacs in KP.
- 5. There are 5 neighborhood double intersections: 1) Thames and Southampton; 2) Victoria and KP Drive; 3) Cromwell and KP Drive; 4) Victoria and Parliament: and 5) Cromwell and Parliament. These intersections easily cause confusion when specifying location(s) on our Next Door on-line discussions.
- 6. Street with most intersections: Southampton (14).
- 7. One baseball field.
- 8. One children's park playground.
- 9. Two tennis courts, and
- 10. Four basketball courts.

Kings Park, the Neighborhood That Almost Wasn't

An Alternate Present Day. You are driving west on Braddock Road in the evening rush. The loud roar of jet engines interrupts the near chaos of your commute; still another commercial passenger jet passes overhead on its way to the Eisenhower-Burke International Airport. Commercial and business buildings surround you; their home-bound employees fill Braddock Road with traffic and horns. "When will someone pay attention to this unbearable traffic?", you wonder. "Something needs to be done, a study, something; one road, even if it is 6 lanes, can't carry this east-west rush hour load alone. And the tolls are sky-high." You chuckle at your pun, but quickly lose that bit of humor as you slowly, oh so slowly, plod on towards your home in George Mason Forest, the closest subdivision to the Eisenhower-Burke International Airport and just east of George Mason College. Another jet passes overhead. You turn up the volume of your streaming service.

This imagined scenario could have been real. Washington National Airport opened for business in 1941. By 1950, the airport was judged to be not suitable for the larger passenger jets then flying, or about to fly, the skies of America.

President Eisenhower, as recommended by his advisors, selected the Burke area as the site for a new international airport. That was when the few residents of Burke learned that their land was condemned and would be purchased by the federal government.

The federal government either acquired or intended to acquire about 4,500 acres of land for the proposed airport. But things began to go amiss for the airport planners. The citizens of Burke, around 300, fought back; they formed the Burke Civic Association to respond as a group to the challenge. Lawyers and an editor from the Washington Post lived in Burke and legally and publicly built obstacles to prevent any further acquisition of land. One farmer obtained a permanent injunction "to block the airport from building within 12,500 feet of his 100-acre farm". Numerous temporary injunctions filled the air. Surrounding communities expanded around the site more rapidly than expected. The project was grounded. Almost 900 acres of the government-owned, but no longer needed, land later formed Burke Lake Park. The rest of the acreage was auctioned off to form the planned community of Burke Center.

But this story does not have a completely happy conclusion. Many of the Burke residents, who had accepted the government buyout, did not return to their old homesteads. And when Burke was abandoned as an international airport site, federal government attention, without a public hearing, turned to the less-expensive and less populated land of the Willard area of Fairfax County.

The residents of Willard could not maintain the coherence of the Civic Association they formed to fight the government demands. Everyone went their own way to contest the land acquisition. The government paid an average of \$500 an acre, and more than 300 buildings were bulldozed. Between January 1959 and April 1961, the 87 property owners deeded 9,800 acres to the federal government. Shiloh Church received \$4,000, and the congregation and church graveyard were relocated to the present-day location near Conklin, to which several other black families from the Willard area had moved.

Dulles Airport opened in 1962.

There you have it. We live in Kings Park because of the actions of the 300 people who formed the Burke Civic Association. These citizens of 1951 had the feistiness, solidarity, legal expertise, and the ability to use newsprint to reach the general-public, and successfully combated the takeover. Their actions are the reason you live in Kings Park; Braddock Road, however, remains a problem in either scenario.

The native species included in the NoVa Conservative District's 2018 seedling sale have been announced!

This year's species were all chosen for their deer tolerance. While no plant is completely deer-proof, these seedlings are less susceptible. They help clean our water and air, prevent soil erosion, provide valuable habitat, and add beauty and resilience to your landscape. Enjoy!

The Shrub and Small Tree Package (\$16.95) will include two each of the following: Common Witch Hazel, Silky Dogwood, False Indigo Bush, Spicebush and Shadblow Serviceberry. The Tree Package (\$11.95) will include two each of Eastern Redbud, Shortleaf Pine and Pawpaw. All species are Virginia natives and wildlife friendly! 

Save Lake Accotink is a non-profit organization that was formed in response to the danger that Lake Accotink may disappear as part of the ongoing Lake Accotink Park Master Plan Revision.

Lake Accotink is an invaluable resource to the community. Perhaps more than any other lake in Fairfax County, it serves a diverse socio-economic and multi-ethnic population. We cannot afford to lose the recreational opportunities and the wildlife habitat Lake Accotink provides. The lake is vital to the environment. It provides a home to protected animals, such as bald eagles, and traps polluting sediment from upstream. Without the lake, nearly twice as much sediment would clog lower Accotink Creek, killing aquatic wildlife, including an endangered species of freshwater mussel.

As part of Fairfax County Park Authority's (FCPA) Lake Accotink Park Master Plan Revision, FCPA has proposed six options for the future of the lake. Three of these options, which the county seems to favor, get rid of Lake Accotink as we know it along with its wildlife and environmental benefits. The other park amenities would also be removed.

. The details are far from decided, but the estimated initial cost of Option C is $$45\mathrm{M}$, which will require a park bond. We need as many signatures as we can get by May 28, 2018 to get the bond on the 2019 ballot.
