Neighbors,

As I now continue into my ninth year as the Civic Association President, I again want to sincerely thank the board, committees, and community members for the outstanding support and encouragement they have given me. My special thanks to our newest Board members, Alison Maruca and Shauneen Werlinger, who have stepped forward to help continue the work of the KPCA with new and exciting opportunities for the community. This should be a better year for the KPCA as we try some new community activities and attract more members.

The 2019 Kings Park July 4th Parade and Picnic (our 55th) will begin at 10:00am, *one hour earlier*, this year. We have made some adjustments to ensure the continuation of the traditional street parade and picnic in the park. The KPCA will again cover the cost of hiring a police officer to provide traffic control and protect the parade participants for this year's parade. The 2019 July 4th parade medals for 2019 will be given to the children participating at the start of the parade at Kings Park Elementary School.

The July 4th Picnic in the Park will start immediately after the parade at 11:00am. The Kings Park Band will entertain with Patriotic music and the KPCA will have our traditional hot dogs, chips, and drink for sale (\$5). This year, the KPCA is adding kids activities and a bake sale to the program this year. We will continue to welcome EVERYONE to the picnic and hope that we can encourage more membership in the KPCA.

There isgoing to be more effort by your KPCA volunteers to encourage more attendees to enjoy the benefits of membership by joining the KPCA. The dues are only \$25 (\$20 for seniors) per family/household. We will have extra lanyards if you would like to volunteer some of your time!

Many residents don't realize that the KPCA is responsible for the upkeep of the common areas of Kings Park – entrances at Kings Park Drive and Southampton, median strip on Kings Park Drive, the two traffic circles, and the traffic calming nubs (bump outs) along Southampton. These are costs that are borne by membership dues.

The number of volunteers that perform Neighborhood Watch is declining. We have lost many of our active volunteers and would like to see more involvement from our residents. A typical neighborhood Watch patrol is a great chance to experience the sights of Kings Park and see for yourself what community spirit means. Do you realize what positive impact a Neighborhood Watch program has on the community's safety and security?

The recent Senior's Luncheon gave me an opportunity to talk with our seasoned residents and answer their questions. Fun Facts about the 4th of July/Independence Day

- In May, 1776, after nearly a year of trying to resolve their differences with England, the colonies sent delegates to the Second Continental Congress. Finally, in June, admitting that their efforts were hopeless; a committee was formed to compose the formal Declaration of Independence. Headed by Thomas Jefferson, the committee also included John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Philip Livingston and Roger Sherman. On June 28, 1776, Thomas Jefferson presented the first draft of the declaration to Congress.
- Only John Hancock actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. All the others signed later. The Declaration of Independence was signed by 56 men from 13 colonies. The average age of the signers of the Declaration of Independence was 45. The youngest was Thomas Lynch, Jr (27) of South Carolina. The oldest delegate was Benjamin Franklin (70) of Pennsylvania. The lead author of The Declaration, Thomas Jefferson, was 33.
- The names of the signers of the Declaration of Independence were withheld from the public for more than six months to protect the signers. If independence had not been achieved, the treasonable act of the signers would have, by law, resulted in their deaths.
- The only two signers of the Declaration of Independence who later served as President of the United States were John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.



The stars on the original American flag were in a circle so all the Colonies would appear equal.
Betsy Ross, according to legend,

sewed the first American flag in May

or June 1776, as commissioned by the Congressional Committee.

• The first Independence Day celebration took place in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776. The Liberty Bell sounded from the tower of Independence Hall, summoning citizens to gather for the first public reading of the Declaration of Independence by Colonel



John Nixon. Every 4th of July the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia is tapped (not actually rung) thirteen times in honor of the original thirteen colonies.


- In 1941, Congress declared 4th of July a federal holiday. It is one of the few federal holidays that have not been moved to the nearest Friday or Monday. In 1781, several months before the key American victory at Yorktown, Massachusetts became the first state to make July 4th an official state holiday.
- Independence Day acquired its unofficial theme song on July 4, 1897, at the Manhattan Beach Music Hall on the eastern end of Coney Island. On that Sunday afternoon, sometime after 4 p.m., John Philip Sousa lifted his baton and cued his band to launch into their latest hit, "The Stars and Stripes Forever." Sousa had not composed it specifically for the holiday, but it has been a marching-band staple on every Fourth of July since 1897.
- Traditions place the origins of "Yankee Doodle" as a pre-Revolutionary War song originally sung by British military officers to mock the disheveled, disorganized colonial "Yankees" with whom they served in the French and Indian War. It is believed that the tune comes from the nursery rhyme Lucy Locket. One version of the Yankee Doodle lyrics is "generally attributed" to Doctor Richard Shuckburgh, a British Army surgeon. According to one story, Shuckburgh wrote the song after seeing the appearance of Colonial troops under Colonel Thomas Fitch, V, the son of Connecticut Governor Thomas Fitch.
- President John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe all died on the Fourth. Adams and Jefferson (both signed the Declaration) died on the same day within hours of each other in 1826.
- Benjamin Franklin proposed the turkey as the national bird but was overruled by John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, who recommended the bald eagle.
- Barbecue is big on Independence Day. Approximately 150 million hot dogs and 700 million pounds of chicken are consumed on this day.
