Treasurer's Report VP of Finance, Susan Malmberg

Since August 1, KPCA had income of about **\$1,140** (most from Oktoberfest) and expenses of about **\$8,500.** The largest expense categories were lawn care and community events. The events that KPCA supported were Oktoberfest, Halloween Decorating Contest and Trunk or Treat. Many administrative costs are due at this time of year, such as insurance, web hosting and Zoom hosting. We also printed the Gazette and paid to have the brick entrance signs cleaned

and the message boards repaired. Again, we have enough cash on hand to cover the excess of expenses over income. Starting in January with the new membership dues coming in, our income should be closer to covering expenses.

Please let us know what community events you would like to see in the coming months. This is your community and we welcome your ideas and your volunteering to help bring them about.

As of December 1, 2021, 454 families have paid their 2021 KPCA dues. **Membership in the KPCA is only \$25 per calendar year (\$20 for seniors).**

Storm Drains: Keep them Clean VP of Community Safety, Susan Cappa

Only Rain down the Drain! Yes, you can prevent or lessen pollution of our local streams, rivers, and ultimately the Chesapeake Bay by limiting what goes down your storm drain. Every time it rains, or snow melts, pollutants such as litter, oil, grit, chemicals and bacteria flow off streets, sidewalks and driveways and are carried by runoff into storm drains.

Common sources of water pollution from residential sources are shown in the graphic below:

- swimming pool discharges
- vehicle washing and maintenance
- animal waste
- yard waste disposal
- unsecured garbage / trash
- improper pesticide application
- construction materials and paint

Some of the sources of pollution were a surprise to me, so I reached out to the Stormwater Planning Division in the Fairfax County Department of Public Works for clarification, specifically on what was the most environmentally friendly way to wash your car.

They provided the following guidelines:

- Wash vehicles on a grassy surface so the water goes into the ground, not into the storm drain.
- Limit the amount of soap that you use and use mild detergents, especially those that are phosphate-free;
- Use as little water as

possible. Turn off the hose while soaping up the vehicle and rinse quickly;

• Try waterless car washing soap, many of which are biodegradable.

In addition to the details on washing your car, there are other specifics that can help keep our water supply clean. Do not rake or dump grass clippings or leaves into the storm drain. Never dump treated swimming pool water, pet waste, used motor oil, paint, chemicals or other substances into a storm drain. Secure garbage on collection days to avoid trash reaching the storm drain.

As homeowners, we can all help to prevent pollutants from reaching the county's waterways.

Remember - only rain down the drain!





Recycling Right By Beverly Boschert

The curbside recycling bin program is designed to collect specific materials. Keep items loose, clean and dry – never in plastic bags. Placing wet, sticky item in the bin reduces the recyclability of other material. If you are unsure if something is recyclable in the bin, "When in doubt, throw it out."

Items to Always Place in the Curbside Recycling Bin:

- Plastic Bottles and Jugs (dry with lids on)
 Metal Food and Beverage Cans (rinsed and dry)
 Cartons (rinsed and dry)
- •Mixed Paper and Cardboard (flat)

Items to Never Place in the Curbside Recycling Bin:

- •Plastic Bags, Film and Pillow Packaging (return to grocery store)
- •Food Bags and Wrappers (trash)
- •Glass (take to purple bin)
- •Shredded Paper (put in compost)
- •Diapers (trash)

Mixed Packaging (cardboard with plastic, etc, trash)
Clothing (donate)
Batteries (alkaline in trash, lithium to FxCo e-cycle)
Foam & Plastic Takeout Cups and Containers (trash)

Reduce waste by purchasing fewer single-use products.

Reduce. Reuse. Recycle.

"LITT'L BIT O' BRIT" TOUR By Sandy Kester, Kings' Park resident since 1999

'Allo, *Lads* and *Birds* [guys & girls], let's *crack on* [get started] with another *Lit'l Bit O' Brit* tour discovering the origins of our neighborhood street's names. Get right on the bus; now, now, there's plenty a room, don't be *throwin' a wobbly* [tantrum] and *bein' a berk* [unpleasant person]. Today we have for ya two street names that have to do with w'er. Yes, w'er. W.A.T.E.R. Like I said - w'er.

Speakin' of w'er, no *bevvys* [beverages] on this tour 'cept for w'er bottles. Now, where was I? Oh, yeah, w'er. Today we are touring Thames Street (pronounced "Tims") & Avon Court, respectively, both rivers.

Let's play "Did ya know that?" Did ya know that the river Thames...

- is 215 miles long, its widest part being 18 miles across; narrowest width is 59' 1"; the deepest depth is 66' with 214 bridges along the flow; 184 miles of foot path along its side and 45 islands along the way
- formerly hosted "Frost Fairs" from 1608-1814. Used as a fairground where street vendors and tradesmen would place their wares, games and products out on the frozen river for purchase and sport
- in 1858 the stench was so bad from the filth that parliament was suspended (being nearby) which forced it to develop the city's

[London] first sewage system and now it's where 2/3 of London gets their (treated) water from it

- its name is derived from Latin: 'tamesis' meaning dark because of the sediment at the bottom
- in 2006 Lewis Pugh once swam the length of it and it has over 200 rowing clubs [row boats] using it yearly
- had a polar bear swim in it? Given to King Henry III in 1251, kept in the Tower of London; summer time, in it went.

Much smaller than the Thames is the river Avon, only 83 miles long. It takes its name from the ancient Celtic word 'a fon,' meaning river. So it's the River River. We is Brits...we do that. The most famous part is the town of Stratford-upon-Avon, 91 miles NW of London near the edge of the Cotswolds. It is a popular tourist attraction (2.5-3 million yearly) as being its hometown hero's - William Shakespeare birthplace (1564) and grave site (1616). Before 1639, the only way to reach Stratford town was by treacherous roads. By adding locks and weirs to the Avon, connecting the canals, it became the dominant mode where "great trade of sugar, oil, wine, tobacco, iron and lead are carried by [the Avon]," stated the author of Robinson Crusoe, Daniel DeFoe.
