Build a Bamboo Mason Bee House By Beverly Boschert


Although bamboo can be a nuisance growing in your yard, it can be useful for garden stakes and creating a border for flowerbeds. It is also a versatile material for crafts. One simple craft that utilizes excess bamboo and supports pollinators is a mason bee house. Mason bees are prolific pollinators who construct their nests in naturally occurring gaps, including hollow stems or holes in wood.

To make a mason bee house, you'll need:

- One empty tin or coffee can, label removed and washed
- Clean, dry, hollow bamboo stalks
- Nail and hammer
- Twine to hang the bee house

Directions:

- 1. Trim your bamboo stalks to fit into the can.
- 2. Using a nail and hammer, punch a hole in the bottom of the can to thread the twine through.
- 3. Thread the twine through the hole and knot it.
- 4. Pack the bamboo lengths into the can as tightly as possible.
- Hang your mason bee house against a flat surface where it will be protected from wind, facing south or southeast for maximum sun exposure.

## Safe Holiday Decorating! VP of Community Safety, Susan Cappa

It's too late to publish an in-depth article on decorating for Christmas. (Also, it would take up an entire issue of the Gazette.) However, here are some guidelines to ensure that what you've already put up is safe.

#### Trees

If you have a live tree, check the water supply every day. A live tree is full of needles and sap, which smell wonderful but are highly flammable. Keep the tree out of the way and away from drafts or vents. If your tree leans, use guy wires to anchor it. If you have an artificial tree, make sure it's labeled fire resistant. If you're lucky, your artificial tree comes with lights and a timer. If it needs lights, use the lighting guidelines below. For ornaments, consider using unbreakable ones on the lower branches and put those antique glass treasures safely out of reach of pets, children, and clumsy adults.

#### **Lights, Indoor and Outdoor**

A big part of Christmas decorating is the lovely lights. To keep your display safe as well as beautiful, check your light cords for fraying or cracks and don't link

more than 3 strands together. Keep the lights on for a limited time every night and turn them off when you go to bed. If you've got old lights that heat up, replace them with new LED lights. They last 25 times longer, don't heat up, and use 75% less electricity. Safer and cheaper! Win Win!

#### **Holiday Plants and Greenery**

I'll bet you already guessed that many of our treasured holiday plants are poisonous or irritating to the skin. Keep poinsettias out of the reach of children and pets. Amaryllis and cyclamen are sold as holiday plants but are poisonous. Holly berries look edible, but are poisonous, too. Also, those swags of greenery that look so lovely draped over the fireplace are not poisonous but are as flammable as Christmas trees. Either remove the garlands or don't use the fireplace. On the plus side, Christmas cacti are very pretty, bloom at Christmas and are perfectly safe!

And don't even dream about lighting candles near anything or leaving them unattended!

# Compliance Corner: Parking in Kings Park Secretary, Eric DeTurk

Kings Park is one of the largest communities in Fairfax County and with over 1100 homes we are all aware of the vehicular traffic that transits our neighborhood daily. Fairfax County has established traffic and parking codes to help continue to a keep our residents and roads safe. These codes are enforced by the Fairfax County Police Department who can be contacted on their non-emergency line at (703) 691-2131 if you would like to report a violation. If parking is creating a problem, please contact the Northern Virginia VDOT office at 1-800-FOR-ROAD (367-7623). Remember:

#### Don't Park

- within 15 feet of a fire hydrant
- within 30 feet from stop sign
- within 20 feet of intersection
- within 20 feet designated cross walk
- within 10 feet of driveway
- on sidewalks
- facing the opposite direction of the travel lane



- commercial vehicles, trailers, or semi-trailers on or adjacent to roads (exception: one registered/licensed taxicab or limousine per dwelling and temporary activity)
- dumpsters or other containers, including a storage PODs on the public right-of-way
- vehicles without a valid safety inspection sticker (if required by state of registration) or current license plate on front and back

Parking of boats/trailers/RVs and vehicles undergoing minor emergency repairs on public roads in Kings Park (unless otherwise restricted) is allowed as is commuter parking on public roads. Additionally, parking on both sides of a narrow road is permitted, however if parking is creating a sight problem, please contact VDOT.

It's hard to believe it's December, and 2023 is right around the corner. There is a lot going on behind the scenes at Parliament Pool, and your volunteer board is hard at work. If you have been by the pool lately, you are probably aware that we are spending a great deal of time in the off-season to make improvements to the facility. These improvements include new flooring, pump house and restroom maintenance, landscaping and drainage upgrades, gallons and gallons of paint, and much, much more. We will be sharing updates on these improvements over the course of the off-season via Facebook, so make sure you follow along.

You may have also noticed that we launched a new website and membership platform. We want to make it as easy as possible for our members and guests to renew their memberships, reserve lap lanes or facilities, purchase guest passes and concessions, and keep track of all their engagements with our pool. One big change from previous years is registration for next summer will open on January 1st! In early January, past members and SSP's will receive an electronic invoice which will enable you to renew your membership for the 2023 season, either through Pay-Pal, credit card, or by check—you will even have an option to pay by installment. New and prospective members and SSPs can also register directly on the new website linked in the QR Code below. As usual, we are offering an early bird discount until March 31st. In preparation for the 2023 summer season, our most exciting off-season project is the renovation of the pool's play area. We recognized the value in providing this other-than-swimming activity for our younger members and determined there was a strong need to improve our playscape to an adequately sized, structurally-safe, and of course, FUN, facility. In November 2022, we completed Phase 1 of the project—leveling the area and adding a square 35-foot mulch pit surround—and we are now moving into Phase 2. The new playground will comply with current playground safety standards and will be manufactured in the USA. It is also modular, and can be expanded in the future.

At this time, we are reaching out to our families and community businesses and asking for your financial support. The goal is to raise \$20,000. Our Swim and Dive Team has generously donated \$7,000 and has offered to match each donation up to an additional \$3,000 to help complete the construction of this project! We have plans that include different playsets depending on the amount raised, and any unused or additional funds collected will be used to purchase additional items for the play area such as picnic tables or modular expansions in the future.

To show appreciation for your support, Bronze and Silver level donations will be recognized in the Parliament Press newsletter. Gold, Platinum, and Diamond donors will receive permanent recognition on signage next to the new play area.
