




National Night Out Neighborhood Event...Strengthening Community-Policy Relations for 40 years! Secretary, Eric DeTurk

LAKE ACCOTINK DAM STREAM CROSSING

The project consists of creation of approximately 300 linear feet of asphalt trail improvements and 325 linear feet of an elevated concrete pedestrian crossing over the dam outfall in Lake Accotink Park. Total project costs, inclusive of design, permitting, testing, utilities, construction, and administration is just over \$3 million dollars. Active construction is anticipated to be completed by early 2023. Residents should expect occasional construction traffic entering and exiting the Accotink Park Road entrance. Portions of the surrounding Lake Accotink Trail will be closed and posted during construction. The piers are complete, and crews are currently working on forming and pouring the decking. Questions? Kings Park Heritage By Herbert G. Persil

The land now occupied by Kings Park residents has been a part of the rich heritage of Virginia. Ownership of the properties can be traced to Lord Culpeper who, in 1690, transferred the lands which now include Kings Park and Ravensworth Farm to William Fitzhugh. The land passed through Martha Custis, the wife of George Washington, to her son George Custis, then to his daughter, Mary Randolph Custis, who married Robert E. Lee at Arlington when he was a young officer in the U.S. Army. After the outbreak of the Civil War, Mary Custis Lee moved to relative safety at the Ravensworth Farm. Ownership of the property remained in the Lee family until World War I when the land was sold to the Glatfelter Pulpwood Company. The company removed most of the softwood trees but retained the hard wood, many of which is still in abundance in Kings Park. In the early 1950's the properties were sold to a Baltimore investment firm and those which were to become Kings Park were later sold to Richmarr Construction Corporation.

A number of landmarks in and around Kings Park still retain vestiges of their early history. According to legend, Rebel Hill, known to a decade of Kings Park commuters, acquired its name from an ambush carried out by Colonel Mosby and his raiders during the Manassas Campaign. Braddock Road is said to have acquired its name from being part of the route followed by General Braddock, accompanied by George Washington, into Pennsylvania where General Braddock met his death at Fort Duquesne in 1755. Rolling Road is said to have been named for its use as a road on which to roll specially constructed hogsheads of tobacco to Occoquan Creek at Colchester. Herbert's Crossing (Rolling Road and the Southern Railway tracks) may have had a share in civil War activity. As recently as 1969, relics of the War, such as bullets and other Civil War accoutrements were discovered on the property of State Senator Omer Hirst, which adjoined the railroad tracks. In 1862, after a raid at Burke's Station, famed Confederate Cavalry General Jeb Stuart is said to

have telegraphed the Secretary of War Stanton complaining about the quality of Union rations he had captured. Within Kings Park itself, from about the intersections of Clydesdale Road, Victoria Road and Kings Park Drive, earthen emplacements could be traced along the hill running down to Piccadilly Place. These fortifications were destroyed with the building of homes in the area; however, it is possible that these were defensive positions constructed during the Manassas engagements or to defend portions of the railroad.

Kings Park, as we know it today, began in March 1960 when a 200 acre wooded tract was purchased by Richmarr. Initial construction began in late 1960 at the entrance of Kings Park Dr. from Braddock Rd. In July 1960, the Routh Robbins Corporation opened its sales office on the southeast corner of Victoria Road and Kings Park Drive near five model homes: the King, Queen, Prince, Princess, and Duke, with the Duchess added later. Construction proceeded down Victoria, east of Kings Park Drive, down Kings Park Drive, and east down Cromwell. (Homes were sold in the low \$20s). Subsequent sections opened west of Kings Park Drive and in September 1961 the remaining 265 acres on the east side were acquired and filled out Kings Park as it is known today.

This article was written by Herbert G. Persil in October 1971. Mr. Persil lived on Victoria Rd, was active in the Civic Association, served as President of KPCA 1967-1968. Mr. Persil also wrote publications for the US Office of Budget. Kings Park Heritage appeared in the Kings Park Directory in 1972 and was included in the KP Directory for many years.

Neighbor Seeks Help for a Kidney Transplant Sarah LeClaire, Kings Park Resident

When he was in his early 20's, Kings Park resident Rob Haupt found out he had Polycystic Kidney Disease. "I was in the Marines and about to ship out for a tour of duty in Iraq when I developed a hernia," he recalls. A routine, pre-surgery sonogram revealed that he also had the same condition that shortened the life of so many of his family members. Knowing all-too-well just how debilitating the disease's progression would be was quite a blow to such a young man.

Polycystic Kidney Disease (otherwise known as PKD) is a genetic condition where both kidneys slowly fill with growing cysts until the organs fail. The cysts also cause both kidneys to expand wildly, putting pressure on the near-by lungs, resulting in breathing difficulties. Normal kidneys are about the size of a cell phone and weigh between 4 to 6 ounces. Rob's are both the size of full-term infants and weigh just as much. Currently, there is no cure.

Now 41 years old, married (to --full disclosure-- me) and the proud father of two kids, he is in kidney failure. His days are marked by constant, nagging fatigue due to his kidneys inability to filter toxins out of his blood. Despite all of these challenges, Rob never complains, continues to work full-time and does his best to be present for his family. A kidney transplant would instantly restore his health.

While he is currently on the National Kidney Registry's waiting list for a deceased organ, his best option is for a living donation for a variety of reasons. Firstly, the current wait on the list for his blood type is seven years. Also, the list only provides organs from people who have very recently died. Once a person passes away, their tissues start to immediately die, thus shortening the life of the donated kidney. Organs from living donors last far longer. Additionally, according to the National Kidney Foundation, a kidney from a living donor functions immediately since it is out of the body for a short amount of time. Because of the


testing done on potential donors, the kidney is guaranteed to be healthy. With a deceased donor, the kidney's overall health is unknown, resulting in far poorer long-term outcomes.

Thanks to a relatively recent development, people with any blood type can help save Rob's life. In 2000, a transplant surgeon in Ohio developed the Paired Exchange Program. It is a complex algorithm that pairs a donor with a recipient of the same blood type. In exchange for the donation of any healthy kidney, Rob is given a kidney voucher, which guarantees that he will receive a kidney of his blood type as soon as it is available. Suddenly, his seven year wait would be cut down to mere, much-needed months.

There are currently over 100,000 waiting on a life-saving kidney transplant. Your neighbor is one of them. Will you please help?

Make Our Streets Safer VP of Community Safety, Susan Cappa

How many times have you seen or been involved in a near miss traffic incident and wished law enforcement was nearby? How many times have you wanted to report unsafe road conditions and get them fixed? Well now you can communicate these unsafe conditions, courtesy of the Northern Virginia Families for Safe Streets. It's a grass roots organization working to make our streets safer for everyone with chapters in Fairfax, Arlington, and Alexandria. I attended a couple of the Fairfax County group's monthly meetings and was very impressed by the initiatives being undertaken. Although there were 32 pedestrian fatalities and 53 serious pedestrian injuries last year in Fairfax County, pedestrian safety has not been an important factor in road construction and maintenance. Safe Streets seeks to remedy that by providing facts, figures and a voice for pedestrians. Check out their web site https://novasafestreets.org/ for more about their mission and their activities.

One of Safe Street's most exciting projects is a reporting system that enables anyone enter data on a near accident or an unsafe road condition. These citizen reports are summarized in a Dashboard, which is a graphical depiction of the information. The goal of the project is to supply data on unsafe conditions in an easy to understand format to be

used when making decisions on street safety. Fill out forms by going to the website and clicking on the Near Miss/ Dangerous Locations Survey. Yes, I did fill out the form and it's easy to do. Then, you can access the Dashboard, which is really interesting. It shows the data from the survey as well as the data from TREDS (Traffic Records Electronic Data System). By clicking on the dashboard map, you can go deeper and actually read the near miss reports. There are lots of near misses out there!

Since Safe Streets is grass roots, there was much discussion in the monthly meetings about how to get their message out to the public. An article in the Kings Park Gazette seemed to fit the bill. Someone from the Kings Park Civic Association will continue to attend their monthly meeting, with the goal of passing information on their activities to our residents and passing information, such as the Braddock Road Multimodal Improvement project, back to the Safe Streets group.

So there's a new tool in town to help us get safer streets. As they say on the Safe Streets Homepage: Lives Depend on You.

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"LITT'L BIT O' BRIT" TOUR

'allo, Ducky. Prepared are ya for another bus tour of our neighborhood's streets? We're discovering why our streets are named after British people, places, and things. Today we're going to two "Ds": Durham and Derby Courts. Jump on in, we're 'appy to 'ave ya.

Durham, known for its Romanesque & Norman-like Castle built in the 11th century, has housed Durham University since 1832. Durham means in Brythonic (Celtic) "dun" or "hill fort and "holme" is Old Norse for "island." Durham has a famous Dun Cow legend first published in 1593. Villagers carrying St. Cuthbert's (a popular saint whose shrine/bones were said to produce healings) bier were wandering in the north and became stuck on a hill at Warden's Law. Despite much effort it wouldn't budge. During the town's three day fast, St. Cuthbert appeared to a monk and said, 'Go to Dun Holm.' Along the way they met a milk maid who was searching for her lost cow. Taking the congregants with her, she led them there and they settled on a "wooded hill island formed by the meandering river Wear." (pronounced weer). They erected the original Durham stone church in 998 which was replaced by the present-day cathedral in the 11th century. In 1093 St. Bede's bones were also entombed there and now draws many pilgrims to the city yearly.

The city of Derby was originally known as Derventio and was captured by Lady Aethelflaed of Mercia (the northern region of the English kingdom) away from the Vikings in 917. Its name was first recorded – in Old English – as "Deoraby" meaning, "village of the deer." Its coat of arms has two deer standing on their hind legs. Down the city center flows the river Derwent. Here are some famous facts about Derby:

- Derby cathedral, originally All Saints' Church, was built in 943 by King Edmund of Wessex. Its name changed in 1927.
- Shrovetide [mob] football was played yearly there since the 12th century.... until a mayor's head was "severely bruised" and it was banned in 1846.
 Those dastardly politicians spoiling all the fun.
- Erasmus Darwin Charles' grandfather founded

- the Derby Philosophical Society, a gentleman's club, in the 1700s.
- In 1717 the first water-powered silk mill was established. It's still in existence as a museum.
- The famous nurse Florence Nightingale, though born in Italy, grew up in Derbyshire, England but moved frequently. In the Derby cathedral is an alcove dedicated to her memory.
- Rolls Royce opened a factory in 1907 during the industrial boom and is still in usage today.
- In 1977, on the 25th anniversary of her ascension to the throne, Queen Elizabeth II awarded this town "city" status. Otherwise, it was one of the few towns that had a cathedral but not city status.

Well, fellow travelers, there you 'ave it. Lovely people and lovely places to visit. Wish we could all jump on a plane to visit right now. Come back next time for another tour. Watch your step on your way out. Cheers, Love!






