Since the beginning of the KPCA fiscal year on August 1, 2023, our income is **\$1,525**. This is made up of \$435 membership, \$280 Gazette ads, \$285 donations, and \$525 Oktoberfest revenue.

The expenses for this period are \$5,206. The payments were for \$644 Gazette printing, \$100 Community Event, \$1,123 Oktoberfest, \$97 National Night Out, \$1123 Mowing, \$550 Contributions, \$657 Web expenses, and \$475

Administrative expenses.

Australia, as of 2018, no prime minister has lasted a full term in office because the parties themselves are consumed with infighting."

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Snow Removal for All in Kings Park

This year, all of Kings Park will be plowed when there's snow and ice. Previously, Frontage Road (also known as the Rolling Road Service Road) was not plowed, because no government had jurisdiction. However, thanks to the staff at Supervisor Walkinshaw's office, plus Fairfax County Road Staff and VDOT, we have now worked out who has jurisdiction over all Kings Park streets. Here's what to do if you are not plowed, regardless of where you live.

If you live anywhere other than Frontage Road, your streets are plowed by the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT). If you have issues with plowing, contact VDOT online or at 1-800-FOR-ROAD (367-7623). Residential streets are plowed after interstates, emergency routes, and high volume roads. If you live on Frontage Road, your street is plowed by Fairfax County. The county plows only a few miles of streets as part of the Fairfax County Road Maintenance and Improvement Program. If snow hasn't been removed from Frontage Road, email the Maintenance & Stormwater Management Division or call them at 703-877-2800. When reporting the plowing issue, identify the street as the Rolling Road Service Road, not Frontage Road. If you live on this street, keep this information handy, since this is the first year that the Frontage (or Rolling Road) plowing

procedure might be implemented by Fairfax County. (The procedure was developed last year, but there was no snow last year; however, we have verified that the plowing procedures are still in effect.) Since Frontage Road (or the Rolling Road Service Road) is a priority 4 road, it will be plowed after police stations, hospitals, and other county facilities. However, it will be plowed, if we keep reminding them by calling or emailing.




Eric DeTurk, Kings Park, Citizen of the Year

Whimsey Corner By Terry Boschert

<u>Selected Facts about our Earth.</u> Earth is the only planet that we know of in the Universe that can keep us alive. Any extraterrestrial aliens out there, please let me know if I err in that statement. I need a topic for my next Whimsey Corner article.

The Earth is around 4.6 billion years old. Earth is the third planet from our Sun and is the largest of the terrestrial planets (Earth, Mars, Venus, and Mercury). The Earth is the densest planet in our Solar System and is the only planet not named for a mythological god or goddess. The Earth's atmosphere is composed mainly of nitrogen (78%), oxygen (21%), argon (.93%), and carbon dioxide (0.03%). We breathe less than ¼ of the contents of our atmosphere.

In 536 A.D., a world-wide dust cloud blocked out the sun for a full year, resulting in widespread famine and disease. The population of more than 80% of Scandinavia and parts of China starved to death, 30% of Europe died in epidemics, and empires fell. No one knows the exact cause.

Imagine that you are swimming out in the calm ocean and then suddenly you are being sucked down into a huge, tumbling underwater waterfall! Yes, this terrifying moment could be your personal glory if you swim near an island called the Republic of Mauritius that is located 1,240 miles from Africa's southeast coast, near Madagascar.



In the very early life of Earth, a Mars sized planet, dubbed Theia, collided with Earth-1 creating Earth's moon and Earth -2. We live on Earth-2, by the way. Whatever life and geological features Earth-1 may have harbored, the collision completely obliterated it. This collision with Theia left behind massive hunks of Theia's guts within Earth's mantle AND spawned the debris that would go on to create our moon.



Earth-1 absorbed large pieces of Theia! The absorbed pieces combined are bigger than our Moon! Two massive, distinct blobs are embedded deep within the Earth. One lies

beneath Africa and another below the Pacific Ocean. These blobs are thousands of miles wide (size of a continent) and likely denser with iron compared with the surrounding mantle, making them stand out when measured by seismic waves.



The Earth is almost 25,000 miles around. With extreme engineering, one could build a road that surrounds the Earth. If a car, never in need of a refill, speeds at 100 MPH, the exhausted driver would reach the endpoint of the road 10 days and 10 hours later. I do not volunteer.
