
2025 Seedling Sale By Beverly Boschert

Get REAL: It's Real ID Time By Susan Cappa

May 7, 2025 is an important date. In addition to being two days after Cinco de Mayo and a week before Mother's Day, it's the first day that a Real ID drivers licenses go into effect. A Real ID is



an upgraded version of a state-issued driver's license or identification card that meets federal security standards. In Virginia, Real ID's are optional and you don't have to replace your regular driver's license with a Real ID; however, if you

travel by plane or try to enter some federal buildings and military bases a regular driver's license just won't do; you must have a Real ID, or a valid passport after May 7! Even if you don't travel by plane, it's a good idea to upgrade to a Real ID, as a precaution because security restrictions are becoming tighter.

Since we have a new DMV Center on Braddock Road, it's easy to do. You can get all the data about Real ID's on the DMV website: DMV.Virginia.gov and can fill out the application

online. If you're not comfortable following the online instructions, you can make an appointment with the DMV office and fill out the application form there. DMV is located at **9855 Braddock Road**, call 804 497 7100 to schedule an appointment. Their hours are Monday through Friday from 8am to 5pm and Saturday from 8am to noon.

Whether you start the application process in person or online, you have to bring required identification documents to your DMV appointment. Bring one proof of identity (birth certificate or valid US Passport), 2 proofs of Virginia residency (such as utility bills or bank statements or mortgage statements), your Social Security card or number, and a proof of Virginia income. If your name has changed, bring proof of the change (marriage license, divorce decree). After the DMV officials receive your application and review your documents, you get a new picture and a temporary driver's license. Ideally, your Real ID would come in the mail in about 2 weeks; however, as the May 7 deadline gets closer, expect wait times to increase.

Climate Corner: Small Steps can Equal Bigger, Positive Changes By Karen Vahouny

I'm happy to report that our first-ever *Climate Corner* generated positive feedback and suggestions, so we'll plan to continue.

One neighbor requested that we continue to solicit eco-friendly ideas and positive steps – and to share those with our 1,100 Kings Park residents via this newsletter column.

So, that's what we'll do! Here's a continuation of the prior column's "Top 10 list," which includes more positive environmental, energy and sustainability steps that members of our KP community have taken. I hope you can try some of these and that you'll continue to send more ideas.

One step at a time

A recurring theme is to start simply and make some small changes. The result: positive impact over the months and years. One KP resident wrote, "We tend to have better success when making one (or two) changes at a time."

Here are more ideas that we can add to our prior "Top 10" list. We'll now call this Our Top 20. (Smile)

- **11.** Buy from local farmers. The Fairfax County <u>farmers'</u> <u>markets</u> kick off in April, with the Burke market (by the VRE station) on April 19 (8 a.m. to noon) and the Audrey Moore Rec Center market (on May 7 (2 p.m. to 6 p.m.
- **12.** Bundle your Amazon orders (and click the Reduce Carbon option).
- **13.** Cut disposable towel use: a reusable Swedish dishcloth is an eco-friendly way to clean the kitchen counters.
- **14.** Reduce paper towel use by using small hand towels to dry hands.
- **15.** Replace disposable paper napkins with reusable cloth napkins.

- **16.** Start using a plant-based sponge for washing dishes. (Several people recommended this!) Here's <u>one</u> that I've started to use.
- **17.** Use a five-gallon bucket with a screw top lid (kept outside with trash/recycling bins), as an interim step between the kitchen counter compost bin and final disposal at the farmers' market/landfill.
- **18.** Try to avoid using single-use plastic straws when dining out.
- **19.** Instead of printing documents and editing them "the old-fashioned" way, send it to yourself (or others) via email and use online comments/edits.
- **20.** And #19 leads right into #20: Reduce paper. Save documents on your computer or laptop versus printing them out and filing them. Financial, tax, medical and other documents can be accessed online. Re-use wrapping paper from birthdays and holidays. (I can't tell you how many presents have been wrapped with what began as a large, wrapped gift. And it saves money, too!)

Stay tuned for these in upcoming months. One article will spotlight a KP resident and Fairfax Master Naturalist, who will share ideas on ways to combine voluntarism with climate-positive steps. Another will feature a unique family volunteer project that generated both government and private sector support.

Kings Park Resident Selected as Braddock Citizen of the Month

The January 10 issue of the Braddock Beacon, produced by the office of James Walkinshaw, our Braddock supervisor, recognized a KP resident as its January Citizen of the Month. This recognized Eric Vahouny's efforts in spearheading a cleanup effort (involving family members and friends) under the Rolling Road bridge, close to our Southampton Road entrance.

Here's the article from the Braddock Beacon:

The January Citizen of the Month is Eric Vahouny of the Kings Park community! According to family members, Eric has always had a strong love of nature and an interest in protecting the environment. He also has a spirit of volunteerism inherited from his grandfather, Bob Mondloch, who was the leader in creating the Mondloch House shelter in Alexandria. While walking along a bridge for a major roadway in the Braddock District in Spring 2024, Eric noticed a large amount of trash under the bridge near the railroad tracks – the sight of the trash piles and their impact on the environment concerned Eric. When he notified his family members of the large pile of trash he had discovered, the family had just created the Mondloch Climate Collective (MCC) to focus on climate initiatives and extend their family's long history of volunteer activism. The family and a few neighbors agreed to clean up this large trash pile as one of their first environmental projects. Eric researched and contacted Clean Fairfax for assistance. They provided him with trash bags, gloves, and other supplies. When Eric and the MCC volunteers showed up to begin the cleanup, it quickly became evident that trash bags were not enough,



and that they would need more bags and steady feet to maneuver down the steep hill. After Eric and the eight volunteers cleaned up as much of the trash as they could, they contacted the Braddock District Office for guidance on how to dispose of the trash collected in bags and the remaining trash closer to the railroad tracks. The challenge they faced was in safely removing the trash near the busy traffic on the roadway. In the end, the entire cleanup project required coordination between Eric, MCC volunteers, Clean Fairfax, the Norfolk Southern Railroad, and the Virginia Department of Transportation. While it turned out to be a bigger project than the volunteers expected, Eric's discovery of this area in need of environmental cleanup led to a coordinated effort by several agencies to address the immediate issue. Thanks to Eric and the volunteers, the land area under the bridge was returned to a much-improved condition. Eric's spirit of volunteerism and environmentalism is why Supervisor Walkinshaw is proud to recognize him as the January Citizen of the Month.

Whimsey Corner By Terry Boschert

All of you are historic survivors. Your ancestors once numbered as few as 10,000 humans. Here is a brief history of the challenges your direct ancestors faced.

The Black Plague: Scientists know that the bacillus travels from person to person through the air, as well as through the bite of infected fleas and rats. Both of these pests could be found almost everywhere in medieval Europe, but they were particularly at home aboard ships of all kinds, which is how the deadly plague made its way through one European port city after another.

Black Death 2 Causes, Symptoms & Impact

The Black Death epidemic had run its course by the early 1350s, but the plague reappeared every few generations for centuries. Modern sanitation and public-health practices have greatly mitigated the impact of the disease but have not eliminated it. As many as 50,000,000 died, half of the European population from the plague.

Black Death 2 Causes, Symptoms & Impact | HISTORY

Approximately 100,000 years ago, during the Paleolithic Era, the first known case of plague afflicted humanity. Although details are scarce, gleaned from the slightest traces in archaeological remains, during our early ancestors' residence in Africa it is believed that a great plague descended upon the region. Decimating the *homo sapiens* population, which dropped potentially as low as just 10,000 humans, the epidemic almost rendered our species extinct. In so doing, however, it is believed the survivors were sufficiently strengthened on a genetic level to endure future outbreaks and pandemics to consequently procreate through the ages. 20 of History's Most Devastating Plagues and Epidemics - History Collection

The Antonine Plague, also known as the Plague of Galen, was an ancient pandemic that devastated the Roman Empire between 165 and 180 CE. In 178 CE the plague exploded once again. It is estimated the epidemic was responsible for the deaths of approximately five million.

Other disasters that killed millions of us: Plague of Cyprian during the 3rd century; Plague of Justinian in 541 and 542 CE, The Plague of 664 CE, the smallpox epidemic of 735-737 in Japan, "cocoliztli" killed tens of millions in the centuries following the Spanish arrival in the Americas, and many more examples exist.

You can understand what barriers your ancestors passed to produce you.
